- It would be nice to see something tangible in the community to justify spending on the levy. So far the impact of the levy is negligible and despite significant rises in home occupancy.
- I think the West Park development lacks community facilities e.g. hall, community cafe, space for booking

- What would be the purpose of such a facility? It would end up empty and add additional cost. Why not use existing facilities such as the school, pub or cafe?
- A community centre would provide a local space for residents to mix and support the formation of local group social groups

- West park and all the new housing developments are attracting lots of young families to the area, and there is very little in the way of community space for things such as children's classes, playgroups, clubs/ youth clubs and activities for the older children
- We don't need more buildings, we need more green spaces!
- School, cafe and pub on the doorstep. Don't want to have to pay any more levy.
- I think a community facility would be a great addition to west park. It would need to have activities and opportunities for all ages (not just kids groups or knitting groups) for example could it be used for things like music groups, language lessons, fitness/ yoga/Pilates etc Hired out for parties. I think it should have things that are 'free' but also things that make it financially viable like the classes mentioned or hire on an evening. It would need to have a kitchen area and possibly a bar (that could be hired for a fee). It could also be a space used for coffee mornings etc for socialising
- It depends what it is!
- It would be an essential part of bringing the community together.
- I think that a community facility would be ideal for the community to come together. If you look at West park centre it is filled with major super markets, which I think is needed however there is no where for the community. The closest thing to this is the cafe.
- To build a centre for community activities and the opportunity for partner organisations to deliver outreach sessions to the people of West Park in the community they reside in. This would continue the development as a sustainable community.
- A community centre offers space for a community to come together. We can host classes for fitness, education and general well being.
- If it was useful and provided a safe, inviting space for children/teenagers to socialise
- Community is very important.
- I think the area could do with a community facility however, the levy is increasing as it is. I would be concerned at how much extra this would cost residents to fund
- It is missing a community centre / hub
- I would be supportive of a warden/litter picker, because that's what I see (litter) in the children's play area. And when walking through the park in summer I spotted youths trying to set fire to the trees and riding offroad motorcycles!
- Depending on the use and benefits to the West park levy paying residents. How it will be funded, who will manage it and will it be voluntary? What functions will it be used for and will non levy payers be able to hire at a higher rate?
- It would be great to have a space we can all be proud of.
- This would bring a village together in many ways.
- Depending on what is available as to whether it would benefit me personally, but I'm sure it would be of great benefit to many residents.
- I think the cost of this needs to be considered not only for price but time. What will it be used for that other areas couldn't already (such as the park, Scout building in Cockerton etc.), are we going to put another building out of use? If it was built who would open or close it, who would police this or hold this responsibility. It could potentially be good as long as it isn't used by kids to do nothing and then others don't use it due to feeling intimidated and then it eventually gets abandoned, something for the community could be lovely for lots of people to get involved as long as it can be used for the majority of the time (day/ evening) or would it be built then costing the community money to sit empty. Would the levy be used? In that instance would people who contribute towards the levy be prioritised (for example if an activity had too many people subscribe to it and some aren't from the area would it be first come first serve or those in the local area prioritised?). It also depends where it would be, would be lose parkland we are all paying to upkeep? Would this add to the levy cost? Other areas have had small 'sheds' or hubs and we could always



look at that to see how successful it was. I think it should be a premises with nothing valuable such as computers left in if possible unless it has a safe to hold iPads or whatever needed as that would also result in extra CCTV and potentially policing.



- With the size of the area a central hub is essential for communication in the community.






- 4. Please rank the possible activities or events below which you think should take place in a facility?



- Happy to be outside, proud of where I live 🗐
- Just love living near to green space, it's great to walk the dog, it's fairly well maintained, friendly etc. Would love to see the green spaces used more e.g. for music events like in the past / a Christmas event e.g. craft stalls / Christmas tree on Winding Way / Easter egg hunt
- Under managed.
- Sounds great to connect them but the current paths are barely maintained or tidied as it is and end up where you can't even walk down there without walking through flooding caused by stagnant leaves left on the pathways. Also they're barely lit and not very safe.
- Love to walk out and improves my mental health.
- Some of the green spaces are in a bad state of repair particularly on some of the areas outside homes. The central section that leads down to the Aldi is fine (despite some poor drainage) but other areas are poor. What is happening to the play area?
- West Park is of such great value to Darlington. A fairly wild park and large outdoor space on the edge of the town. I didn't really factor in the park when buying my house here but it has honestly made a massive difference to my life and I use it most days of the week dog walks, a lunchtime stroll, as a cut through to Cockerton. It's great. I would love to be involved with the community orchard. It would be great to organise massive picnics there
- Important to have such spaces
- Enjoy the green spaces and park.
- The nature reserve was a lifeline to many during the pandemic and continues to enable local residents to enjoy the outdoors on their doorstep
- The green space and park was one of the main reasons we moved here 11 years ago. Having a park on our doorstep is fantastic
- It important for fitness and well being.
- We moved into West park in August 2022, I haven't received and information on green spaces and or planned amenities. It may be good idea to share information more freely with new and existing residents
- It improves your wellbeing living in a lovely area with a good outlook. Would have scored 5 if Invention Way had been kept nice last year but the area has far too many weeds.
- Lovely to look at and walk through
- Makes it a lovely place to be
- They break up the building landscape so you don't feel like you're on yet another new build estate. They were invaluable in lockdown also as they gave residents a green space on their doorstep, despite not being in the countryside
- Could definitely be better. Not enough in newer parts of estate. Also dogs off lead my dog has been bitten three times since we moved here 18 months ago
- Nature really knows it all. Trees and woodland = tranquillity; rubbish and disregard = some locals
- The clock and dagger approach by the west park levy! How money is spent and the impression made by the ranger was extremely disappointing rather lethargic and disinterested in her comments and answers! The current green space is poorly managed and unless you like mountain biking you don't Benefit. Excessive



amounts of levy money wasted on failed jobs (path & drainage ditches) hideous metal notice boards. Anytime you ask or comment it's always the councils job!

- We're really looking forward to the green corridor being completed and the linear park being created. It will be lovely to walk along. I hope more work will be done on the green corridor soon.
- Great place to have to walk the dog on our doorstep.
- I feel the need tidying up, dog poo bins are often overflowing, the park has been redone (children's play area) and it's still not clean, there is always water overflow in the park (on the path) which in winter is dangerous and charges for bulbs which we need more of or a better planting schedule
- Love having the park on our doorstep.
- In the summer it looks great with the wild flowers and tree in bloom. However, during the autumn and winter it is drab, waterlogged and flooded. The park pond in the park area is disgraceful. It used to be a calm reflective spot but now it is a dirty dumping ground.

The green corridor is flooded during the rain and parts of the path are impassable. During the summer it looks great but few as though these standards need to be more consistent year round.

- We need lots of green space to stop the estate becoming a concrete jungle.
- The green space is wonderful but I don't feel safe walking there alone and there are many irresponsible dog walkers.

I also feel that the community would benefit from a restaurant that remains opens early evening, maybe with some AI fresco seating in the summer for a nibble and a drink. Although the pub is great I'd be encouraged to eat out more if there was an additional option from 5.30pm onwards.

It's a huge wish but a gym would be amazing too. Many of us work from home and the benefit of having one to walk to and attend quickly on a lunch break would be worth a premium membership fee (in my opinion) it should be accessible to all age groups but particularly be welcoming to those who may feel intimidated by a stereotypical weights gym and memberships be open to west park residents.

I often feel as though there isn't much for our retired neighbours and community members to get involved in directly here, they often head to Cockerton for more activities and groups which align with their preferences where other age groups can get involved too would be amazing.

- The green spaces are vital to the well-being of the community but they're potential isn't maximised, litter and dog waste is a huge problem and the play park could be far better.
- I've been provided with no attached plans or further information. This is very disappointing. How can I make an informed decision?





- I love the space but it's feeling a little shabby in areas (poss to do with it being towards the end of winter) but there's a lot of litter and dog dirt about at times



Volunteering - e.g. putting together food parcels (I'm sure there's a north east charity that does this), litter picking - new community centre with kitchen could be 'pick and pie and peas' Paid-for days out, like the ones organised by the community centre at Firth Moor - I went on a coach trip organised by them to the Edinburgh Christmas Markets a few years ago and it was great. Monies per head could pay for the cost of the bus and driver plus a small bit extra for the charitable angle of the levy trust Councillor monthly meetings could be held at the hub (sorry this should have been mentioned in the first page)

- Having something like an annual summer gala would be a great community event, or even a Christmas themed event.



- Family friendly events, light displays instead of fireworks,





- Some additional seating but not so that it impacts the look of the park
- None
- Just needs to be inviting
- The paths through the park aren't brilliant for prams/strollers when there's been lots of rain. All well and good putting sand/gravel paths down but they're hazardous during the winter months. Also due to the park having next to no lighting it's useless to use as a walkway to the estates as it just breeds antisocial behaviour. The children's park itself is also an accident waiting to happen as the 'improvements' that were done to it still make the park dangerous and a hub of antisocial behaviour.
- Paths sorted,
- Gated for levy payers only, Improved security to reduce asb
- Areas to sit and admire the view. Picnic areas with tables, stone ones like in the playground so they can't be vandalised or damaged. Spend money on maintenance so it remains a nice place. We don't need any additional facilities which would dramatically increase overheads.

- More green space, have them in several areas in between the new builds not just one isolated park. There is land near cussins development that would be perfect for a playing field/meeting area, outdoor gym or PT sessions/boot camps, perfect as a play area for kids, you could even install park equipment there and still have a huge area for all other activities.
