Welcome to our latest annual newsletter, with a glance back to see what we did in '23 and a quick look ahead for what's in store for '24.

We are fortunate at Westpark to live in such a place with fabulous green spaces on our doorstep with a great community spirit. Our original aims of Caring, Sharing and Daring are still alive and well in Westpark.

Our aim of Caring for the environment is maturing alongside the Park and the green corridor from the Village Centre to the new Phase of the Garden Village. The development approached its 20th Anniversary in 2025, and the Trustees are shifting our focus in 2024 to our second aim of Sharing our great green space more with each other.

The Park has a record on delivering community events over the years and these were disrupted by the Covid 19 lockdowns. We want to rebuild an events programme fit for our community's future and which meet the ideas sent in during our consultation in 2023.

Over the next two years, starting in spring, we have partnered with Stellar Creates to help us deliver these events. The team at Stellar Creates would love to hear your views on their initial ideas via the Community Consultation 2024. (see link on the back page)

There will be plenty of opportunities to get involved, through volunteering your time and expertise, attending our new programme of events and having your voice heard in one of the Friends of Westpark meetings

The Westpark Levy Trust's third ambition is to be Daring in all that we do, this can be seen through us trying out innovative solutions to challenges, effectively spending levy funding whilst continuing to apply for external support to deliver best practice solutions. Whilst our primary focus will be on the community, we continue to enhance and improve the park. If you a have an idea or a project you would like to deliver or you would like to share, we can give you time to speak in a community meeting or you can email or message us on social media.

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Eye in the Say

It took a while but they're now here. Our two new CCTV camera are in operation Don't forget to smile and wave at the nice people from Darlington Civic Enforcement monitoring everyone's safety in the park and play area when entering the Park from the main entrance near Lookers or from the black path near Nickstream Lane.

The CCTV cameras were suggested by local police and civic enforcement. Attendees at a Friend's meeting, 2 years ago, agreed that the Trust should support the installation of the two new cameras.

Levy payers have provided £36,000 towards the installation. Moving forward the operational and maintenance cost will be paid by the council.

Resident's view

"While the park and play area has always felt safe to me it's good to know that CCTV is there to keep an eye on any dodgy behaviour. Especially things like quad bikes. I understand that when residents report a problem to the council they will be able to contact police or their civic enforcement people to get here really quickly if there's anything untoward going on. That's got to be a good thing -and a deterrent I'd have thought. It's good to know that if you report a problem there could be video evidence of who it was."

We've also included a summary of the main findings of the questionnaire on page 19 together with news of our plans to take some of them forward.



We've done it again. Well done us (everyone who has picked up the litter, helped to plant bulbs or helped tidy the park or just not made a mess in the first place!).

Once more we've achieved the prestigious Green Flag Award for Westpark. With only about 2000 awards across the whole country and with South Park in Darlington as the only other local winner. Big thanks to Pippa Smaling and her team from Darlington Borough Council. This year we got our highest score yet with the judges

commenting "The management plan is well written and presented... (and) looks to cover subjects comprehensively... This is an excellent community country park and shows the way forward for integrated high quality urban living... There is very good community involvement."

Each year, to ensure that we keep Westpark up to scratch, the Levy Trust makes a contribution to DBC (who own and manage the park) for extra maintenance and to plant additional wild flowers and bulbs over and above what the council provide as part of their service funded by rate payers.

IMPROVING THE ENVIRONMENT

Planned projects to improve our environment

Last year we were really pleased to support West Park Academy's Eco-Team who led the whole school's effort to improve the environment and reduce litter across the school and the wider community. We attended a whole School litter pick and were able to fund more litter picking equipment to supplement that provided by the school and Darlington Borough Council. We look forward to working with the Eco-Team in 2024 as they aim to achieve the Green Flag Eco School award.



Site Survey

The trustees have commissioned a Topographical Survey across Westpark, to mark the changes across the site which will help us plan enhancements and improvements for future years, This will involve the use of a drone and station-based modelling and will inform improvements to our long-term management plan.



Wild Flowers

The council's wildflower allocation has been reduced for the 2024 season, The Trust appreciates how much the vast majority of people enjoy the colour the annual wildflowers bring and the continued management of the perennial wildflowers areas which a host of wildlife calls home. This means that to maintain what we enjoyed last year, the Levy will need to meet the reduction. We are happy to move, maintain or expand an area of wildflower planting. If you have any ideas or views please let us know by February's Friends of Westpark meeting.

Benches

The community survey users' feedback about the park and the Green Flag Judges commented that the park could benefit from additional seating. So the trust has set aside funds for an additional 3 seats in a similar style to those currently in the park alongside refurbishing the current wooden sections of the current seats.



Litter Bins

Litter is relatively low across the park, though the play area and main entrance bins can become full and overflow quite quickly, especially in good weather. We have been in discussions with the Council about the installation of larger capacity wheelie bin style bins which will be easier to collect by council staff, the Trust looks forward to bringing this increased capacity to the park in 2024 with sympathetic housing in keeping with the high quality and the arts and craft style of the community spaces. We have asked Differentia.co.uk for some design proposals.

Signage

We have also asked Differentia.co.uk to continue the design proposal of integrating Phase1 and Phase 2 with appropriate signage to help knit together all parts of the Garden Village. This will consist of 7 way-finding posts setting the design as Phase 2 and the Haven linear park continue to develop.



Trees on Tees is an exciting new programme stemming from the Tees Valley Mayor's ambitious plan to plant one million trees and increase woodland creation in Tees Valley. Trees on Trees is part of England's Community Forests, a national network which works with local communities and landowners to plant trees across England to improve the natural environment, protect communities from flooding and improve access to green spaces in urban areas. They can't meet the ambitions of Trees on Tees alone and are calling on people from right across the region individuals, businesses, community organisations and landowners - to sign up and pledge their support and plant trees.

ONE MILLION TREES

Westpark Levy Trust has applied through the Trees on Tree funding to expand the community Orchard with a greater variety of fruit-bearing species. But visit their website to discover how you could also access a free tree to plant. Trees on Tees - Tees Valley (teesvalley-ca.gov.uk)



This year, we're excited to announce the planning of a new playpark at Cow Green.

Based on the 1763 sundial from Stag House Farm, the theme of the playpark is Time. As in the existing playpark, where the image of the Westpark Jabberwock was divided into three parts and placed around the site, so here the image of the sundial will be divided into three. Each part will be accompanied by one part of a riddle, and elsewhere in the playpark will be hidden the three answers. So there will be six pieces in total, again cast in a manner that enables rubbings

to be taken which can be reassembled into a larger image. While the text and artwork here is based around the sundial, the paths and spiral motifs on the planned mound etc. would maintain the Time theme by referring visually to the coils and springs of watchmaking.



Art & poetry unite in a new playpark

Westpark is an unusual development in that we have a very strong Arts Strategy which informs much of what we do. Bill Herbert, an internationally renowned poet based at Newcastle University, is a Trustee and leads on our strategy. The riddle below, will be built into the design of the new play park at Cow Green.

Calling all volunteers! Volunteers are vital in being the glue that binds great communities.



Update on what we've been collecting, doing and spending

We've shown some of the spend in different areas of the newsletter and below we outline some of the other costs and investments we've managed.

CCTV Cameras.....£36,000.00

In late 2021 we were approached by the Police and Civic enforcement team to increase CCTV coverage to maintain the low crime and antisocial behaviour in and around the park. 2023 saw the installation and switching on of the two new cameras connected to the Councils monitoring centre.

Professional Services for Enhancements and Improvements.....£1,072.50

Winter Event Power infrastructure.....£3,148.00

To enable an annual Christmas tree with lights and a powerpoint for other events along the green corridor.

You're part of something pretty amazing

Today Westpark stands as a harmonious blend of history, culture, and living spaces where life is not just lived but cherished. Bussey & Armstrong have taken 20 years to achieve this and hope you like the results of our efforts to make Darlington a better place to live, work and enjoy. Now for the next 20 years...

This year, we're excited to announce the planning of a new play park at Cow Green in collaboration with Darlington Borough Council. Designed with the same adventurous ethos as the playpark near the village centre, this new space promises more than just your standard playground features – so no springy chickens here! We're aiming to create an environment ripe for adventure and exploration. Furthermore, we have plans for artworks along the water main corridor and drainage basins as these areas are landscaped over the next few years. One notable inclusion is a replica

stone facemask of Januarius, known as 'The First Darlington Roman.' This piece is inspired by a portrait found on a Roman-era urn unearthed in the region.

We are also pleased to share that planning permission has been granted for a new Doctors' Surgery, and proposals are currently being developed for a new school along Mortimer Wheeler Drive, near Newton Lane. These developments are a part of our ongoing commitment to enhancing the Westpark Garden Village for all its residents.



As 2023 came to a close two new additions arrived to Westpark. The first Westpark **Christmas Tree was erected following** levy funds spent on a power supply and tree anchor pit. Bussey and Armstrong progressed their plans for a new digital clock destined to grace the Village Centre.



An update on proposed & planned events.

Following our survey earlier in the year and from conversations at our Friends of Westpark meetings (see back page for dates and details) it is clear that people would like the Trust to arrange more events. So we've been talking to DBC and a range of events producers.

We're currently working on a series of seasonal events over the next 18 months leading up to our 20th Celebration of Westpark in the summer of 2025 alongside the 200th Anniversary of the Stockton and Darlington Railway.

Managed by Stellar Creates, an experienced community events company, these will include: Sowing the Seeds of Spring, an Easter event to include a range of family friendly activities

including making bird boxes and bee hotels; spring planting and gardening classes together with art and crafting session.

Music Back on the Hill, a musical celebration to re-establish our tradition of hosting a music event in the park.

Autumn 24: Terrifying Tales of Westpark

Spooky family fun at October half term with story-telling, pumpkin carving, mask-making and working with a writer in Halloween residence to create our own creepy Westpark stories, myths and legends. Be afraid. Be very afraid...

Christmas 24: Winter Lights Now that we've got power and a place for our Christmas Tree, we're planning a mini-festival for all residents and friends with a lantern parade and music to start the festivities.

BENEFITING THE COMMUNITY

Levy Explanation

As home or business owners in Westpark we are responsible for paying an estate levy, established from the outset of the development, to enhance and maintain the quality of the environment and it provides other benefits and activities for the local community of Westpark. This money is managed by a group of volunteer Trustees, including local residents and levy payers.

Kingston Open Spaces are the appointed agent to collect the Levy on behalf of the Westpark Levy Trust, and the developers for both phases 1 and 2. Please visit our website www.kingstonopenspaces.co.uk for more information about Open Spaces and the services we provide.

Phase 1

The annual contribution for the West Park Levy for the period 1st February 2023 to 31st January 2024 is now due. The amount for this year is based on last year's amount plus the annual increase to cover inflation linked to the Retail Price Index (RPI). The exact amount was not available at the time of printing but will be in the Levy payment request which each home owner receives. The Phase 1 agreement

KINGSTON OPEN SPACES

offers a 50% reduction if the payment is made by Direct Debit.

If you do not already have a direct debit in place you can download this from Kingston Open Spaces online portal. The mandate should be completed and returned to us as soon as possible via post or by email to mail@kingstonopenspaces.co.uk.

Phase 2

If you bought your home from Gentoo, Thirteen, Cussins or Bussey & Armstrong Homes, the open space is managed by the Westpark Levy Trust with levy collection arrangements by Kingston Property similar to the Phase 1 levy.

For those properties with the Westpark Levy Trust arrangements, the annual contribution for the Westpark Levy for the period 1st February 2023 to 31st January 2024 is now due.

At the time of printing the final figures were not available but householders will receive these direct from Kingston Open Spaces.

If you bought your home from Esh, Barratt or David Wilson Homes, the open space at the Stag House Farm phase is managed by www.trustgreen.com/ and isn't part of the Westpark Levy Trust arrangements, but you are welcome to attend the Friends of Westpark Community Meetings and volunteer across the village.

As Phase 2 grows so will the creation of new public green spaces and the creation of the new linear park, which we are calling the Haven until a formal name is chosen. In the meantime the Levy for Phase 2 will be ringfenced for use on Phase 2 for projects and enhancements on the phase in discussion with residents.

Update on Community Facility

Westpark Community Hub is the working title for our desired community facility. Most people in the community are keen to see the creation of a community hub which could be used to build a sense of community and which could be used for:


- Social events
- Organised groups
- Space for young people
- Arts and creativity
- Physical health activities

As part of last year's survey (which you can find at friendsofwestpark. com/community-consultation), a good percentage of the respondents expressed an interest in getting involved either as organisers or participants. Now that planning permission is underway for a new Special Educational Needs and Disabilities school, and a new GP practice for Moorlands Surgery, the trust can continue to begin work on the next stages for a Community Hub on Mortimer Wheeler Drive. We've committed some Levy funds to generate some design ideas from an architect and we've got a number of Trustees keen to work with others to develop plans further, start raising funds and help to project manage the hub into being.



We've commissioned a series of events to be delivered by local events company Stellar Creates incorporating ideas from local residents.
